Class B Designate Noxious Weed

Common Name: goathead

Puncturevine is a toxic, annual weed that can be a serious problem in pastures, roadsides, waste areas and cultivated fields. The spines of the fruit cause damage to animals and people.

Everyone benefits when noxious weeds are controlled. Prevention of new infestations is a top priority for the Spokane County Noxious Weed Control Board.

CLASS A WEEDS

Non-native species whose distribution in Washington is still limited. Preventing new infestations and eradicating existing infestations are the highest priority.

Eradication of Class A weeds is required by law.

The following Class A weeds are currently found growing in Spokane County and control is mandated by the WA State Noxious Weed Control Board:

Garlic Mustard	<i>Alliaria petiolata</i>
Wild four o'clock	<i>Mirabilis nyctaginea</i>

The Mission of the Spokane County Noxious Weed Control Board is to act as responsible stewards of the land and resources in Spokane County. We will preserve the productivity and diversity of agricultural land and natural resources in the most cost efficient manner, from the impact of noxious weeds. We will also protect human health and environment by promoting the implementation of Integrated Pest Management control measures. Identification and control of Class A and B Designate weeds will be a priority and we will attempt to reduce the impact of Class B and C weeds to a lower level of significance.

CLASS B DESIGNATE WEEDS

Class B Designate weeds are designated for control in certain regions where they are not yet widespread. Preventing infestations in these areas is high priority. The following Class B Designate weeds are currently growing in Spokane County and control is mandated by the WA State Noxious Weed Control Board:

To help protect the State's resources and economy, the WA State Noxious Weed Control Board adopts a State Noxious Weed List each year (WAC 16-750).

This list categorizes weeds into three major classes—A, B and C—based on the stage of invasion of each species and the seriousness of the threat they pose to the state or a region of the state.

CLASS B WEEDS

In areas where Class B weeds are abundant, control is decided at the local level, containment is the primary goal. The following weeds are growing wild in Spokane County and are mandated for control:

CLASS C WEEDS

Class C weeds are non-native species that are widespread in the county and long-term programs of suppression and control are a local option, depending upon threats and the feasibility of control. The following weeds are mandated for control:
